God Confronts David's Sin

Main passage: 2 Samuel 12

Nathan's Rebuke (v. 1 - 12)

The Lord sent Nathan to rebuke and rescue David. Nathan does so by building a relationship with David, and boldly and winsomely sharing a parable with him. We tend to hide our sin, and we need others to confront us as Nathan does for David.

- Becoming correctable

David's Repentance (v. 13)

- The Severity of David's Actions- David was an expert in knowing the Bible, but he did not faithfully live out the Scriptures. He knew the Bible (references Ex. 22:1), but he was distant from God. David broke five of the Ten Commandments in one episode. He also underestimated Bathsheba's identity as the wife of Uriah the Hittite; an image bearer; daughter; another man's wife. God personally avenges the improper handling of a brother or sister in Christ (1 Thess. 4:3-7).
- The Grace of God's Forbearance- God offered David an opportunity to make things right himself in the year following his sin. God offers an opportunity before He exposes the sin, and when the opportunity to confess is ignored, God guarantees its exposure (Gal 6:7; Num. 32:23). God provides healing and grace following a biblical confession (Ps. 32; Ps. 51; Rom. 10:9).



- David's Confession- The power of a two-fold confession: confess to God and confess to man. (ls. 55:6-7)
 - Biblical Confession (Ps. 51)
 - 1) Proclaim your guilt (v. 3)
 - 2) Perceive the offense before God (v. 4)
 - 3) Plead from your heart (v. 1, 2, 9, 11)
 - 4) Pray for restored fellowship with God (v. 12)
 - 5) Present to God a broken heart (v. 16-17)

Sin's Repercussions (v. 14 - 23)

- Sin's true wickedness (v. 9, 10, 14)- David despised the Word, he despised the Lord, and he utterly scorned God.
- Mercy in the reminders- God's chastisements and reminders were a stern mercy.
- Horrible repercussions- David never recovers; he is never the same leader, worshiper, or warrior. Trouble follows him for the rest of his life and his reputation was ruined.

God's Restoration (v. 24 - 31)

Grace and restoration are seen in Solomon who was the chosen son to continue the Davidic dynasty. Solomon comes from the word *shalom*, and Jedidiah means "beloved of the Lord." There is also still crown for David. Eternal restoration comes through the person, work, and Word of Jesus Christ.
