Hospitality: Love of Strangers in the Home

Main passage: 1 Pet 4:8, 9

1) Drink the Gospel Grace of Hospitality (1 Pet 4:8, 9)

- Hospitality is a gospel grace and is often paired with love. We should love each other, as love covers a multitude of sins showing hospitality without grumbling. Our activity is an investment into gospel grace as we show love and care to those we don't know. Hospitality is the response of the soul that drinks deeply of gospel grace. Lydia showed this level of hospitality after she and her household were converted (Acts 16:14-15). Scottish missionary John Paton dedicated his life to Christ by loving strangers; and our King is worthy.
- Greek word φιλόξενος philo xenos "love strangers" is translated as "hospitality" – opening our hearts and homes to make strangers friends, and friends, disciples.

- B. Do you have a grumbling heart when it comes to hospitality? To ensure your heart is more open to loving strangers, on which aspects of God's unsearchable grace toward you should you meditate?

2) <u>Deploy Your Forward Operating Base</u>

- In the days of the early church, hospitality in the home and in the church was the same because all churches met in homes. 1 Tim 5:9-10 gives us an example of widows, who didn't have much in the ancient near east, that showed exceeding hospitality. While all Christians should show hospitality, elders should be marked by hospitality (1 Tim 3:2). The early church shows us that hospitality in our home is an extension of our ministry (Acts 2:42-47).

3) Deepen Relationships through God's Home



- Everything that we have as a Christ follower is the Lord's, including our homes. Our homes are where we care for and nurture others, an environment to deepen relationships where strangers will become friends who will become disciplemakers. It starts with our willingness to extend Christ's love to another person.
